

Ohio D-SNPs At a Glance

How many OH residents are enrolled in both Medicare & Medicaid?

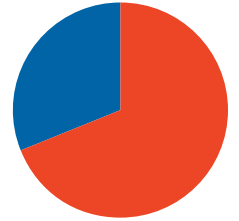
There were about **415,000 Ohio residents enrolled in both Medicare and Medicaid ("dually eligible") in 2023.**¹

288,000 individuals, or about 69%

of dually eligible individuals in Ohio, had full Medicaid benefits. These individuals are referred to as full-benefit dually eligible individuals.

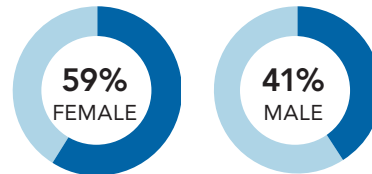
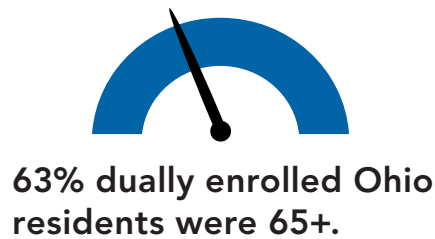
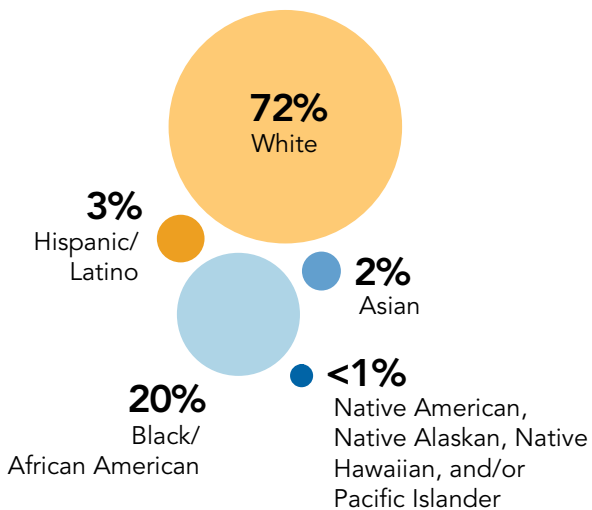
128,000 individuals, or about 31%

of dually eligible individuals in Ohio, did not have full Medicaid; rather, their Medicaid coverage is limited to assistance paying for Medicare costs through enrollment in a Medicare Saving Program (MSP). These individuals are referred to as partial-benefit dually eligible individuals.



What are some features of the dually enrolled population in OH?

According to American Community Survey data from 2017-2022:²



The most common languages reported by dually eligible Ohio residents with LEP were **Spanish, Nepali, and Russian.**

What is the D-SNP landscape for dually eligible OH residents?



About 176,000 Ohio residents, or 42% of people dually eligible for Medicare and Medicaid, are enrolled in a Dual Eligible Special Needs Plan (D-SNP).³

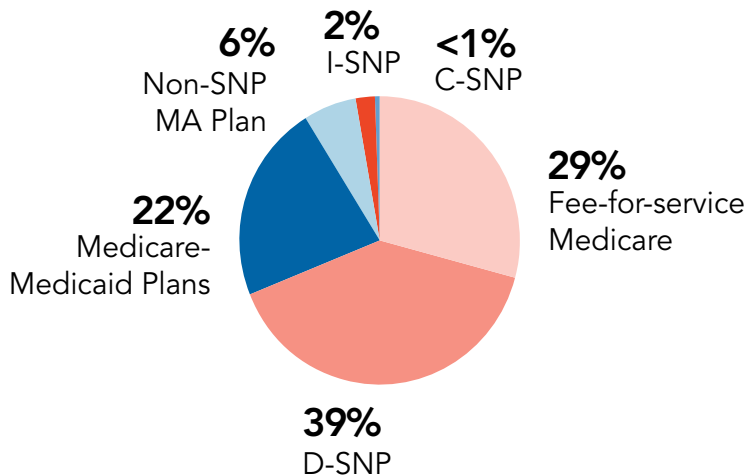
The most-enrolled D-SNP contracts were **United Healthcare, Community Insurance Company, and Care Improvement Plus.**

Dually eligible individuals in Ohio receive their Medicaid benefits through managed care.⁴

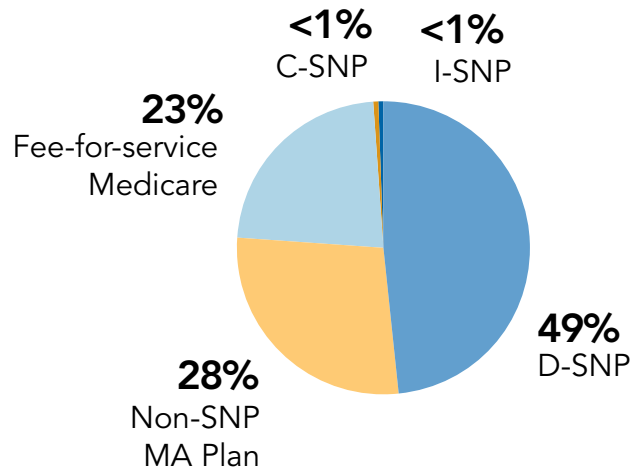
D-SNP plans in Ohio are all CO D-SNPs that are not Applicable Integrated Plans.⁵ MyCare Ohio, a Financial Alignment Initiative duals demonstration, will transition to Next Generation MyCare, a FIDE-SNP, by January 1st, 2026.⁶ For more information on types of D-SNPs, see the [Justice in Aging D-SNP basics brief](#) and [FAQ](#).⁷
